Occupational Safety and Health Order 3900.19C National Workgroup Scoping Agreement

ISSUE:

Provide a collaborative approach for the FAA and NATCA (hereafter the "Parties") to ensure each Line of Business/Staff Office with NATCA BUES has clear instructions either through an Order or standard operating procedures (SOP) for carrying out the requirements found in the Occupational Safety and Health (OSH) Policy Order 3900.19C.

SCOPE:

In accordance with the Parties' OSH Order 3900.19C Memorandum of Understanding (OSH MOU) dated November 15, 2018, a workgroup is hereby established to collaboratively review and validate Appendix A and Appendix B of the OSH MOU for each line of business (LOB) to determine whether any Orders, Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs), or Memoranda of Understanding are needed to supplement Order 3900.19C. The Parties will collaboratively develop plans, as necessary, to address each item listed in Appendix A and Appendix B of the OSH MOU.

Each Party, at its election, may designate up to two (2) workgroup participants. Each Party will designate one (1) member of the workgroup as a co-lead.

Once established, the workgroup will determine the need for subject matter experts and/or subgroups.

The workgroup will have sixty (60) days from the date of the first meeting to complete the following tasks:

- Review Appendix A to determine if the program is applicable to each line of business (LOB) and Staff Office (SO).
- Review and validate Appendix B of the OSH MOU for each LOB/SO to determine whether an Order or Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) is needed to establish the roles and responsibilities necessary for meeting the requirements found in Order 3900.19C.
- Based on the review of Appendix A and the review and validation of Appendix B, the
 workgroup will develop a plan that identifies whether an Order/SOP(s) is needed and
 what must be addressed per OSHA regulations.
- Create a standardized format/process that each LOB/SO can use to develop any needed SOP(s) collaboratively identified by the workgroup, unless either Party determines that the standardized format/process is not feasible for a particular LOB/SO. In such cases, the workgroup will collaboratively determine what action is required in order to address any concerns.

GENERAL:

- 1. Union designated workgroup members shall be in a duty status, if otherwise in a duty status, for all workgroup activities and shall be afforded sufficient duty time to travel for meetings and related activities.
- 2. The Agency agrees to pay for all travel-related expenses for Union designed workgroup members to attend workgroup or sub-group meetings and related activities.
- 3. Union designated workgroup members will be provided access to the same information as any other workgroup member
- 4. Participation on the workgroup or sub-group does not serve to waive any bargaining obligations nor as a waiver of rights guaranteed by law, regulation, or contract.

OUTCOME:

The workgroup will make recommendations to the Joint Sponsors based on consensus. For the purpose of this Agreement, consensus is defined as the voluntary agreement of all representatives of the workgroup.

If the workgroup is unable to reach consensus, the co-leads are authorized to reach agreement. Agreements reached by the workgroup shall be reduced to writing and signed by the co-leads. If the co-leads are unable to reach an agreement, the issue(s) will be elevated to the Joint Sponsors for resolution.

LEADERSHIP COMMITMENT

The undersigned Joint Sponsors authorize this workgroup to operate within the guidelines described in the SCOPE above.

If the Joint Sponsors are unable to reach an agreement, either Party may pursue whatever course of action is available in accordance with Article 7 of the Parties' applicable CBA, the Federal Service Labor-Management Relations Statute, and any other law, rule, or regulation.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE FEDERAL AVIATION ADMINISTRATION AND THE NATIONAL AIR TRAFFIC CONTROLLERS ASSOCIATION

This Agreement is made by and between the National Air Traffic Controllers Association, ("NATCA" or the "Union") and the Federal Aviation Administration ("FAA" or the "Agency"), collectively known as the Parties. This Agreement represents the complete understanding of the Parties concerning Occupational Safety and Health (OSH) Order 3900.19C.

Section 1. For each program listed in Appendix A, the Parties will use Appendix B to determine whether any Orders, Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs), or other written directions are needed to supplement Order 3900.19C for each line of business with NATCA BUEs. Within thirty (30) days of the signing of this Agreement, the Parties agree to establish a workgroup to collaboratively validate Appendix B of this Agreement. The Parties will collaboratively develop plans, as necessary, to address each item listed in Appendix A and Appendix B.

Section 2. The Parties agree that any Orders, SOPs, or other written directions determined to be necessary under Section 1 of this Agreement will be developed within one (1) year from the signing of Order 3900.19C and will be implemented, as practicable, when Order 3900.19C becomes effective. The Agency agrees to provide an annual briefing to the Union at the national level concerning all OSH programs that have not been implemented, including the reason(s) why the OSH programs have not been implemented.

Section 3. This Agreement does not constitute a waiver of any right guaranteed by law, rule, regulation, or collective bargaining agreement (CBA) on behalf of either Party, including the Union's right to mid-term bargaining under Article 7 of the applicable CBA.

Section 4. This Agreement shall remain in full force and effect for the duration of the Parties' CBAs, unless modified by mutual agreement of the Parties.
