

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Last night, members of Congress reported that there was a congressional agreement in principle on government funding that, if enacted, would avert another government shutdown later this week. Although we are pleased that the negotiations have resulted in an agreement in principle, we now have three days remaining until the three-week continuing resolution (CR) that ended the recent 35-day shutdown on Jan. 25 expires. The House and Senate must pass legislation, and the President must agree to sign it into law before Saturday, Feb. 16, at 12:01 a.m. EST. Unless there is an agreement or another CR is passed by that deadline, federal appropriations authority for certain federal agencies and departments, including the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), would lapse, and those agencies and departments would be shut down for the fourth time in the last 13 months.

This would be devastating to all of you and the National Airspace System (NAS). It would degrade safety and is unsustainable.

Even with this tentative congressional agreement in principle, we are not taking anything for granted. Our Union is aggressively fighting on multiple fronts to keep the government open. Since the end of the last shutdown, NATCA has delivered a loud and clear message to Congress and the Administration that the 35-day government shutdown was unacceptable, had severe and lasting effects on the NAS, its employees, and the safety of the system, and cannot be repeated on Feb. 16, or ever again. Our message is being delivered to Capitol Hill through an action plan that has and will continue to increase the volume. The action items include

releasing NATCA-led aviation coalition letters, testifying at a congressional hearing, reaching out to national and local media, communicating with members, and engaging in potential rallies. You will see much of this happen this week, including these highlights:

- Earlier today, we began another mini lobby week with 75 NATCA activists arriving here in Washington, D.C., and preparing to return to Capitol Hill to meet with members of Congress and their staff. Their message is two-fold: first, keep the government open and avoid another shutdown at the end of this week, and second, pass H.R. 1108, the Aviation Funding Stability Act of 2019, introduced by U.S. House of Representatives Transportation and Infrastructure Committee Chairman Peter DeFazio (Ore.), and Aviation Subcommittee Chairman Rick Larsen (Wash.), that would authorize the FAA to draw from the Airport & Airway Trust Fund (AATF) in the event of a government shutdown. As we reported to you last Friday, Feb. 8, the bill will provide a limited, targeted way of ensuring stability for the aviation system by ensuring that all FAA programs, projects, and activities would continue uninterrupted. NATCA strongly supports the bill.
- On Wednesday, Feb. 13, Paul will testify before the U.S. House of Representatives Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure, Subcommittee on Aviation, at a hearing entitled "Putting U.S. Aviation Safety at Risk: The Impact of the Shutdown." You can watch the hearing live, starting at 10 a.m. EST, on the Committee's website here.

With the NAS still reeling from the negative effects of the recent 35-day government shutdown, Paul will deliver an impassioned message about how the shutdown eroded the layers of critical elements necessary to support and maintain the safety of the NAS. He will also detail how all of you were negatively affected by stress, fatigue, and distraction caused by the shutdown and the uncertainty about when it would end. He will brief the Committee on the costs to taxpayers, including the shutdown-related delays to critical safety programs, and will explain why we cannot allow another shutdown to happen on Feb. 16, or ever again.

As this week unfolds, we will update you on all news and developments.

Support for Bill Ensuring Stability in the NAS

Today, NATCA, along with 39 other aviation organizations, sent a letter to Chairman DeFazio, Chairman Larsen, and the ranking members of the U.S. House of Representatives Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure and Subcommittee on Aviation in support of the Aviation Funding Stability Act of 2019 (H.R. 1108). This Act would authorize the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) to draw from the Airport and Airway Trust Fund (AATF) in the event of any future government shutdowns. NATCA and the

Member Jamie Green relayed the message that she heard from so many lawmakers that night, "Thank you for your continued

dedication for the incredibly important job you do!"

Said Aulbach, in a press release that Rep. Kuster's office issued, "It's unfair to ask federal employees tasked with ensuring the safety of the American people to work without pay. Using federal employees as bargaining chips for people in Washington to achieve political goals hurts hardworking Americans and puts their safety at risk. This is unacceptable, and I appreciate the opportunity to join Congresswoman Kuster at the State of the Union as she continues her efforts to prevent another harmful shutdown."

Wrote Pesiri-Dybvik in a press release issued by Sen. Harris: "As my family and I have begun to rebuild after losing our home in the Thomas Fire, the hardship we faced during the government shutdown and the looming uncertainty of another potential shutdown-have added a further layer of stress to our already challenging situation.

"Further, as an air traffic control specialist I know that the shutdown eroded critical layers of safety within the National Airspace System and forced my NATCA brothers and sisters to show up at work with the burden of not knowing when their next paycheck would come. I am grateful to Senator Harris for inviting me to be the face of my fellow Californians who have been affected by the government shutdown and recent wildfires."

NATCA's College Scholarship Deadline


